With Pas d'Radis Fiscaux: l'État d'Urgence, a free interdisciplinary event on the theme of tax havens and fiscal inequity, ATSA, When Art Takes Action proposes citizen and artist mobilization that denounces the lax legislation at the heart of the erosion of States, social justice and democracy.

Pas d'Radis Fiscaux : l'État d'Urgence will take place from November 16 to 19, 2017 at Place Émilie-Gamelin and on the adjacent sidewalk of Sainte-Catherine St., both outdoors and under heated tents. The site is open to all and will host the first-ever US/Canada/UK gathering of Arts and Homelessness movement With One Voice, with the participation of 20 Canada-, US- and London-based organizations.

"The title Pas d'Radis Fiscaux : l'État d'Urgence (Tax Havens: State of Emergency) is a nod to the seminal annual gathering État d'Urgence that ran from 1998 to 2010, and a timely circling back to the concept behind ATSA's very first installation 20 years ago, La Banque à bas (The Sock Bank), at a time when fraud and tax evasion on a global scale involving billions of dollars, abetted by traditions of banking secrecy, remove from public coffers more than half of the world's money supply. We have reached a point in the evolution of the

globalized economy where States must regain sovereign control of their tax laws so that multinationals and the world's richest contribute their fair share to public services instead of accumulating vast wealth without any social accountability whatsoever and with impunity," explain Annie Roy and Pierre Allard, co-founders of ATSA, When Art Takes Action.

The event will bring together a wealth of cultural, scientific and activist points of view on the issue and feature original arts programming, spaces for information and discussion, and themed evenings, and ATSA, When Art takes Action continues its tradition of inclusiveness by providing services to the most underprivileged Montrealers, including the return of the legendary **Banquet Cochon**, a five-course meal served under the tent to lonely homeless people by chef Martin Picard from Au Pied de Cochon and his numerous accomplices in the restaurant industry.

Musical performances, movie screenings and performance art will round out the programming, thanks to new partnerships with three dissemination organizations: the **Montreal International Documentary Festival** (RIDM), Mundial Montréal and Les Escales Improbables de Montréal.

As well, **two special evenings** have been planned: on **Thursday, November 16, starting at 5:30 p.m.**, for the opening of *Pas d'Radis Fiscaux*, produced in collaboration with **Oxfam-Québec** and the **Échec aux Paradis Fiscaux** collective, featuring speeches by Alain Deneault and several public figures, followed by the collective performance of *Radis Fiscal* by ATSA; and on **Friday, November 17 at 7:30 p.m.**, for the **Closing Gala of the 21**st **Journées québécoises de la solidarité internationale** (JQSI), *À Humanité variable*, a cabaret-style production featuring numerous artists, plus JQSI spokespeople Fred Dubé and Manal Drissi.

A fable, minus the fantasy! Just like Tax Havens, the Radis Fiscal (literally, "tax radish") is an insatiably voracious beast. It has made a mouthful of all the small radishes in its path, holding them prisoner in its belly, suspended over our heads, proud of its supreme power and its ability to deplete the common good to a critical point, the annihilation of basic human rights. But the Radis Fiscal shall be destroyed in its own right, mocked in the public square, and all the small radishes so vital for our survival will once again resume their role in a real economy that is in the service of the people and their territory.

Thus shall ATSA kick off the ball, by inviting Montrealers to a cathartic participative performance, the collective demolition of its **Radis Fiscal**, **a giant piñata** that will be made to surrender its contents: health, education, infrastructure, culture...—in short, everything society is now doing without because it has no access to the funds that have been usurped by tax havens and tax evasion. Fauré's requiem *In Paradisum*, interpreted by vocal ensemble Voix Ferrées, will serve as an accompaniment to the collective performance.

Under a heated tent, at the Exchange Bank stand, selfies of radishes will be taken, to be sent to federal finance minister Bill Morneau and Québec finance minister Carlos J. Leitão. *Radis Fiscal* is an original creation by ATSA, When Art Takes Action. The big Radis is built by Alex Jenkins. Radish selfies by Cocotom.

The evening will continue with performances by a string of artists. Thanks to collaborations with **Oxfam-Québec**, the **Échec aux Paradis Fiscaux** collective, and researcher, philosopher and lecturer **Alain Deneault**, there will also be artistic and citizen mobilization, speeches and discussion periods in order to raise awareness and an understanding of the consequences of this decadent economic system and the actions that can be taken throughout the year.

Food trucks will offer hot meals, courtesy of generous Montreal dining establishments.

LOOP-S: OPEN OUTCRY + DÉSORCELER LA FINANCE | Luce Goutelle, Loop-s collective (Belgium) Ritual for undoing the spell of finance | North American premiere

"'Outcry' is the name given to a method of communication used by brokers on the floor of a stock exchange. The word also signifies a cry of pain and a collective protest. (As in, the outcry of the Occupy Wall Street movement that rattled the finance industry.) Reflecting the dichotomy inherent in the word — the *outcry* used to broker the transactions at the heart of the scandal, and the subsequent *outcry* of indignation — our project is the expression of a future turnaround in the situation. Thus, *Open Outcry* is intended as a rite of passage to mark the metamorphosis in how we view capitalism, and as a ritual for undoing the stranglehold of finance. From the money market to the real estate market to the energy market, not one stock market is let off the

hook! At the intersection of magic ritual, theatre and political action, *Open Outcry* seeks to rally citizens to the cause of instituting other models for wealth generation and distribution." – Luce Goutelle, author and stage director of Belgian collective Loop-s [making its first visit to Québec; the piece was previously presented as part of Brussels' Nuit Blanche activities in October 2017]

J'TE PASSE UN SAPIN + J'TE VIDE LES POCHES | Maggie Flynn (Montreal) | A new work

An office/truck to empty your pockets!

Place Émilie-Gamelin | Thursday, November 16 at 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.

November 17-18-19 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. and 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Maggy Flynn creates strikingly original relational performance spaces as a pretext for creating encounters, with a mission to question our often too routine daily lives and our relationship with consumption. She brings a healthy dose of absurdity and playfulness to the proceedings. The artist will park her office/truck on Place Émilie-Gamelin as part of two actions: With *J'te passe un sapin* ("I'm swindling you"), she offers visitors a "swindling" service with multiple scenarios, while also relating, in a loop, stories of fraud, using megaphones positioned on the roof of the truck. With *J'te vide les poches* ("I'm emptying your pockets"), participants are invited to enter the truck one by one to empty their pockets, thus providing a glimpse of what their daily survival kit consists of.

INSOLVABLES | Sara Dignard and Julie-Vanessa Tremblay | Québec | A new work Robes de confidences citoyennes ("Gowns of citizens' secrets")

Place Émilie-Gamelin | Thursday, November 16 at 5 p.m. to Sunday, November 19 at 9 p.m.

Dressed in a textile creation by Julie-Vanessa Tremblay (a member of seamstress cooperative Minuit moins cinq), poet **Sara Dignard** will ask the people who cross her path to confide in her about what they would like to save; what they would be *ready and willing to do* to ensure the survival of the planet; and what they hold most cherished. But above all, she will exhort them to save what can be neither purchased nor sold nor bargained, and to "learn to let life open up its own possibilities." The secrets thus confided will be placed in the pockets of the reinvented quilt. The final work will be on display at the Banquet Cochon, and some of the secrets will be shared.

CHÂTEAU DE CARTES ("House of Cards") | Émmanuel Laflamme | Québec | A new work An absurdist playground built from credit cards

Sidewalk along Sainte-Catherine | Thursday, November 16 at 5 p.m. to Sunday, November 19 at 9 p.m.

Émmanuel Laflamme "deals in" pictorial works, recycling popular images in a humorous manner in order to convey social or political messages—sort of like an advertiser with nothing to sell. He uses cultural touchpoints to debunk ancient and contemporary myths, and provides us with his take on the world, which is both tender and critical. He invites passersby of all ages to a game of skill involving exchange: the building together of a giant house of credit cards. http://www.emmanuellaflamme.com/

FRUITS DU JOUR | Soufia Bensaid, in collaboration with Exeko

Interdisciplinary artist Soufia Bensaid will invite passersby to write on a small coloured flag a wish or a secret, and the flag will then be hanged from a clothesline. Over the days, the flags will form a mosaic of thoughts accessible to all.

CARTOGRAPHIE SOCIALE | Emmanuelle Jacques, in collaboration with Exeko

Emmanuelle Jacques uses cartography as a pretext for creating encounters and discussions on the role of habitat and passageways in people's lives. She will put at the public's disposal a series of stamps and maps she herself has drawn and engraved, and invite participants to outline the paths they take every day, the places they frequent, those that have disappeared, and those they cherish, dream of visiting, or avoid altogether. Thus, personal stories are weaved into local geopolitics.

S'IL ÉTAIT UNE FOIS | Florianne Davin, in collaboration with Exeko

Florianne Davin invites participants to take turns writing, in their own language, part of a sentence, without knowing what the person preceding them has written, in order to collaboratively compose a short story, true or fictional, to later be read out loud. Delightful fun!

LE TEMPS D'UNE SOUPE | ATSA, When Art Takes Action Conversation in pairs on the topic of tax havens

November 16 from 5 to 9 p.m.; 17 -18 -19 (, Friday, Saturday, Sunday) from 3 to 9 p.m.

ATSA, When Art Takes Action, together with its partner Soupesoup, presents an edition of this popular installation devoted to tax shelters. Passersby are invited to spontaneously form pairs with perfect strangers and hold conversations about how tax evasion affects us collectively. The backdrop resembles a restaurant terrace and our "maître d' gives each pair of participants a special "Tax Inequity and Lax Legislation" menu of conversation starters. The experience is capped with the creation of a poetic portrait of the duo, and all the portraits are later presented to the public through a slide show.

TROU NOIR : LE CHŒUR EN COLÈRE | Sophie Castonguay (Québec) | A new work Langue de feu !

Place Émilie-Gamelin | Friday, November 17 at 4:30 and 7:00 p.m. | Duration: 25 min.

Contextual artist **Sophie Castonguay** explores the power of words and the creation of mental images, using the power of society as a starting point. She questions how we occupy the world, through the creation of visual devices such as paintings, photographs, videos and installations. In *Trou noir: le chœur en colère*, she invites citizens to gather inside a performative apparatus to chant, following a musical partition with lyrics that beg to be read and heard, thus fostering a critical proximity.

They will be accompanied by the Kiuna collective.

US/CANADA/UK GATHERING ON THE ARTS AND HOMELESSNESS | With One Voice Pas d'Radis fiscaux : L'État d'urgence, host site for the first-ever US/Canada/UK gathering on the Arts and Homelessness

With One Voice tent | Tuesday, December 14 to Saturday, December 18, daytime

Since its inception, ATSA, When Art Takes Action has consistently produced artistic urban interventions in the public space, inviting the public to experiment with its capacity for action and to transform its encounter dynamic. État d'Ugence ranks among the forerunners of the international movement for social protest against social and economic inequality known as Occupy. With this as context, London-based organization With One Voice insisted on having its very first US/Canada/UK gathering on the Arts and Homelessness take place during Pas d'Radis Fiscaux: l'État d'Urgence, in order to anchor the encounters and reflections within the framework of an inclusive event that unites Montreal's isolated and homeless people and those organizations that work year round to support them. In all, 20 Canadian, American and London-based organizations will participate in this US/Canada/UK gathering on the Arts and Homelessness, which will feature several conferences and roundtables open to the public.

An international movement promoting the arts as tools for fighting homelessness, With One Voice's mission is to bring together, on a global scale, artists whose work is informed by the street, in order to give impetus to existing projects, promote new works, and raise citizen and political awareness of the importance of art as a means of support and spiritual sustenance for people experiencing or having experienced episodes of homelessness.

Alain Deneault's book *Offshore: Paradis fiscaux et souveraineté criminelle* (Montréal/Paris: Écosociété/La Fabrique, 2010) is the inspiration behind this 23-minute mashup that illustrates how numerous fictional films have incorporated the reality of tax shelters into their plotlines.

The works presented are partly from sketches the artist made in the 80s and 90s in public spaces, such as the former Voyageur bus terminal, and her main subjects are homeless people.

THE ARTISTS OF THE SAINT-JAMES DROP-IN CENTRE

The Saint-James Drop-in Centre provides a safe, helpful environment to marginalized or homeless persons. For more than 20 years now, it offers members an arts program that includes a permanent workshop. A collection of paintings, drawings and pictorial works from the workshop will be on display.

MÉTISSAGES URBAINS | Exeko

An organization for social innovation, Exeko looks to creativity, art and philosophy to promote the social inclusion of people who are marginalized or at risk of being excluded. Works from 19 creation residencies will be displayed during the event.

→ MONTREAL'S CHEFS GET INVOLVED: BANQUET COCHON

From 2003 to 2010, on the occasion of ATSA's annual État d'Urgence, Au Pied du Cochon chef Martin Picard and other culinary talents organized the *Banquet Cochon*, a five-course meal served to lonely and homeless people, under a heated tent. Street people so appreciated the event over the years that they've requested its return, and Martin Picard has agreed to repeat the experience. He has brought together Michael Picard, who is in charge of his restaurant's kitchen, as well as the chefs from Joe Beef/Vin Papillon, L'Oregon, Le Plaza, Pain dans les voiles, La Colombe and Patrice Pâtissier! Gaëlle Cerf, co-founder and co-owner of popular food truck Grumman 78 and vice-president of the Quebec Street Food Association, will be the maître d' for the Banquet Cochon, which will bring *Pas d'Radis Fiscaux : l'État d'Urgence* to a close in a spirit of sharing.

→ ENCOURAGING CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT AND SOCIAL INCLUSION

L'État d'Urgence mobilizes some 300 citizens—about 15% of them homeless—to participate as volunteers whose role is to ensure the event welcomes the public as well as possible. Organizations of different stripes support ATSA by supplying goods and services of all kinds that account for 60% of its budget. This support helps provide homeless or underprivileged people **two meals courtesy of some big Montreal restaurants**, including Le Mousso, Le TNM and Holder, as well as **donations of warm clothes**.

Ecological values are also front and centre, through composting and recycling initiatives, the use of biodegradable containers, and an incentive to use public transit. Some 7,000 people are expected.

→ ATSA, WHEN ART TAKES ACTION: 20 YEARS OF ART AND ACTION

On December 17, 1997, ATSA deployed its very first *in situ* work of art, *La Banque à bas* (The Sock Bank), illegally installing in front of the Museum of Contemporary Art an ersatz ATM comprised of stoves whose doors served to make deposits and withdrawals of warm socks for homeless people. In 1998, the year of the 50th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and as a continuation of the concept behind The Sock Bank—which decried the obscenely staggering profits of Canadian banks while homelessness and poverty were on the rise—ATSA created an urban refugee camp smack dab in downtown Montreal, calling it *État d'Urgence* (State of Emergency). Till 2010, ATSA produced 11 editions of this annual interdisciplinary artistic "manifestival," which garnered the Citoyen de la Culture 2008 award, and which every winter, over the course of a few days, offered a place for all people to meet and dialogue, and provided shelter and services to the most underprivileged among them. *Fin Novembre* followed in 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2015, recasting the event as a biennial happening.

Behind ATSA, When Art Takes Action are two artists, Annie Roy and Pierre Allard, for whom social and environmental engagement is part of daily life and whose works promote humanistic and solidary values. "ATSA continues in the tradition of those dreamers who bring hope to us all. And the flame of their passion still burns so brightly that it makes one want to set new blazes." – Guy Sioui, artist and sociologist

Please note that artists Annie Roy and Pierre Allard, formerly known as ATSA, now go by the name ATSA, When Art Takes Action. "Global conflicts, barbaric acts of inhumanity that attack our fundamental freedoms, and their hypermediatization giving rise to a turning inward and a racism fueled by stereotypes, have made us shy away from the simple acronym and recontextualize it by adding to it our slogan that conveys our identity as pacifists. And so: ATSA, When Art Takes Action. This is the new name of our artistic collective. It in no way shrinks from our past, but aligns itself with the present."
